PASTOR'S PEACE

A couple of weeks ago, there was a demonstration in Detroit calling for the dismantling and removal of a Christopher Columbus monument that has been in place for long decades. The demonstrators contended that Columbus wasn't worthy of celebration and honor. America was already "discovered" and inhabited by millions of native Americans who were decimated by European diseases that Columbus and those who followed him introduced to these shores.

As it turned out, the demonstration was small: reportedly, not more than two dozen people gathered for it. Media coverage was also limited. There's not much chance that the Columbus statue will go. But this more local episode brought home the kind of controversy that is currently afoot in the American South where there is loud clamor for the take-down of monuments glorifying the men and events of the Confederacy. Given the events in Charlottesville, Virginia where the pro-monument demonstration of avowed white supremacists and neo-nazis resulted in the death of a counter-demonstrator, the monuments business is shaking up our nation right now.

Truth be told, I consider myself a Polish Yankee—or maybe one of the German kind, given my own mixed ethnic immigrant heritage. I have never been sympathetic to Confederacy, which used an appeal to states' rights to buttress the institution of human slavery with horrible and lasting consequences for African-Americans. Those who signed on with the Confederacy were also traitors to the United States, precipitating a devastating Civil War, the bloodiest war in history up to that point. Then when the war was done—won by the North, lost by the South—some tried to ennoble the immoral purposes of their "Lost Cause" by cosmetizing the sin and degradation of slavery. Statues and monuments honoring the Confederacy were erected in place upon place after the Civil War even as parallel efforts were underway to try to keep black men and women restrained or enslaved under the legal rubric of "separate but equal."

I travelled through the South as a kid. Later, I worked as a pastor outside Baltimore, Maryland. I saw the different drinking fountains and the different schools (by then already closed or mothballed) which were anything but equal. It wasn't fair. It wasn't right. It wasn't moral. The spirit and effect of it all definitely wasn't "American," let alone Christian. Personally seeing all that, I understand why African-Americans find

virtually everything associated with the Confederacy—or at least anything that celebrates it—offensive. I would too. As a matter of empathy for fellow citizens who are black, *I do too*.

As anyone knows who knows me, I love art. I cherish history. I agree with the writer and moral philosopher George Santayana who once remarked: “Those who do not know history are condemned to repeat it.” In the United States today we do not study sacred and secular history enough. Many of our young people know next to nothing about the history of our Christian churches, the founding mothers and fathers of our own nation, and the events and persons who have shaped this last century. For all these reasons and more, I absolutely hate to see any statue and monument taken down. We could stand, I think, to erect more monuments and historical markers to remind us of the rich legacy entrusted to us as patriotic and faithful men and women.

Nevertheless, sometimes people whom we have honored, even for a long time, do need to be removed from their pedestal. We saw this in Russia and Eastern Europe, didn't we, as the Iron Curtain fell and the horrors that Lenin and Stalin perpetrated became even more crystal clear? And who begrudged the Iraqis who attacked with sledge-hammers their own statues of Saddam Hussein and then toppled over into the dust whatever remained? Given the brutal regime that slavery entailed for African-Americans, should we expect them to ask for anything less than the take-down of statues honoring Confederate president Jefferson Davis or even the commanding General Robert E. Lee who, cherished myths notwithstanding, has been revealed by historians as a less-than-humane slave master, rupturing much more benevolent practices maintained for generations by his wife's family on the same plantation?

During the first years of the sixteenth-century Protestant Reformation when radical iconoclasts wanted to smash and destroy the image or icon of every Roman Catholic saint in sight, Martin Luther, who actually launched the Reformation, preached caution. It was, he said, okay to retain in “reformed” churches the statues and paintings of those formerly regarded as saints *provided* we could, using our God-given intelligence, relate to and understand their role and past service in a new way—i.e., as faithful men and women—without attributing to them special intercessory powers with God. On the other hand, he agreed, if the paintings and statues of the former saints remained for church-goers a temptation to slip back into old ways of thinking and believing, it really was better to have them gone.

On this score, I second Martin Luther. He was being both practical, charitable, and wise. Accordingly, when we are tempted to remove any controversial monument or memorial we need to assess whether there is anything about the person or event that might compensate for what we legitimately abhor—something positive which might persuade us to keep everything in place as it is, or to do so with some added notice or acknowledgment. At the same, we also need to make sure that we and others have whatever maturity is necessary to keep the monument on hand without injuring ourselves and stunting our own commitment to moral and spiritual growth.

As Christians, following Jesus' example, we believe in calling a sin for what it is. Yet we have respect and appreciation for sincere and genuine repentance that can redeem lives and even transform a sinner into a positive example. That goes for ex-Confederate “heroes” too. We also believe in forgiveness, albeit without continuing to glorify whoever has wronged us or others without regret or apology.

In time, every leader has to face the judgment of history. And in God's time, we are all going to have to face his supreme and eternal judgment. This should give us all pause about how we behave here and now--and for the future. What seems expedient now; what feels good, convenient, and gratifying, may be the worst thing in the world

for us long-term because it doesn't uphold God's values and purposes for our shared lives.

Each and every day, let's put a commitment to God's love and justice first in all things so that we have no reason to fear what future generations will think of us, avoiding the way of those whose lives stand forever in the annals of infamy.

Communion Sacrament Offered During First September Service

A chancel communion will be offered on Labor Day Weekend, Sunday, September 3, at our single worship service, 9:30 a.m. Church members and friends will be invited to step forward to the front of the sanctuary to receive the wafer and cup, symbolizing Christ's body and blood sacrificed for us. Worshipers will be asked to tincture the wafer by dipping it in

the communion chalice. The dipped wafer can be consumed immediately afterwards before returning to your pew.

Our St. Paul congregation observes an open communion. Friends and visitors are invited to participate in communion along with members.

Tuesday Morning Bible Study Reads Gospel of Matthew—Newcomers Invited

Confirmation Classes Get Underway

As the fall season starts at St. Paul, so do confirmation classes for eighth and ninth graders. Led and taught by Pastor Geoff Drutchas and Mrs. Doreen Thompson on Wednesday evenings and Sunday mornings, the classes are intended to equip our church youth to make informed decisions for Jesus Christ, affirming their earlier baptisms. An orientation program for parents and confirmands alike will be held on Wednesday, September 6, 7-8 p.m. in the West Room for all first and second year students. The first Sunday morning class will be held on September 10. The first Wednesday evening class will follow on September 13.

On Saturday, September 9, there will be a day-long class retreat on South Bass Island in Ohio. Our chaperoned confirmands will head to Catawba Point and board a half-hour ferry across Lake Erie to Put-in-Bay. The class will spend the rest of the day exploring the island on bicycle, stopping for prayer and scripture study at various points of interest along the way, including the Perry Peace Memorial, the third highest tower in the federal park system.

In event of rain the retreat will be rescheduled for a week later, Saturday, September 16. Cost of the retreat is \$25, not including lunch. This covers the island ferry, bike rental, and other incidental admission fees. Our island tour on September 9 will include a visit to the Ohio State University Marine Biology Laboratory on Gibraltar Island, a quick boat ride across from downtown Put-in-Bay. Another stop on Gibraltar Island will be Jay Cooke's 19th-century castle.

Last Chance to Join 'Women in Prayer' Fall Retreat

There's still a place for you at the upcoming St. Paul Women's Retreat on Saturday and Sunday, September 9 and 10. Led by the experienced and spirited team of Debbie Case, Vickie Snow, and Laurel Plagens, and hosted by the Dorcas Society, this fall's theme is personal prayer—a topic always relevant for us as Christians. The retreat provides an opportunity for women of faith to share time together and reflect on how God is speaking to them today, particularly in the face of Christ's command to forgive. More than twenty women have already signed up for the overnight retreat which will combine both small and large group activities at the attractive Michindoh Conference Center in Hillsdale, Michigan. In addition to group time together, participants will enjoy a wide variety of indoor and outdoor activities. Count on lots of singing and shared laughter as well.

Owned and maintained by Spring Arbor University, Michindoh draws church groups from Michigan, Indiana, and Ohio to its beautiful 250 acre grounds, which includes a 27 acre lake surrounded by trails. The conference center offers hotel-style rooms for two to four persons with private baths and linen service in a completely smoke-free facility.

Participants will be car-pooling and caravanning from the St. Paul parking lot on Saturday at 7 a.m. The retreat begins at 10 a.m. Once again, there is an option of also spending Friday night, September 8, at Michindoh prior to the regular start of retreat.

The cost of the two-day retreat is \$97, which includes three meals and one night of lodging. An added Friday night stay with two meals is \$55.

A \$20 non-refundable deposit will assure your place at the weekend retreat with balance due a week prior to the retreat. Deposits will continue to be received until the available spaces fill up. Our retreat facilities can accommodate up to thirty women. In the event that you cannot attend the retreat after paying for the full reservation amount, your payment in excess of the \$20 deposit will be returned to you in full if someone is interested in taking your place.
