Safety and Security

For the next couple of months we will be highlighting some safety measures that are in place at the Church to help keep you informed. This month we will be covering **FIRE EMERGENCY**.

In the event you discover a small fire, notify a member of the Emergency Response Team of a member of the church staff immediately. If the fire is beyond the point of a safe attempt to extinguish it call 911 immediately and do the following:

- Follow the St. Paul Building Evacuation Plan. (located throughout the Church)
- Do not Panic, Remain Calm.
- Members of the ERT or Staff will provide help for the disabled persons in the building.
- Isolate the fire by closing doors.
- Proceed to one of the outside designated assembly areas. Parents know that their children will be taken to these areas.
- Do not break windows Oxygen feeds a fire.
- Be aware that moving your vehicle could hinder access by emergency vehicles.

Fire Extinguishers locations are as follows: **1**. By Church Front Doors, **2**. Top of Balcony Steps, **3**. Family Room foyer, **4**. East Lobby, **5**. Boiler Room, **6**. Fellowship Hall by pop machine , **7**. Hallway from Fellowship Hall to West Lobby, **8**. Stage Basement, **9**. West Lobby, **10**. Kitchen (special grease extinguisher), **11**. Fellowship Hall Emergency Exit, **12**. West Room Emergency Exit, **13**. 2nd floor Hallway outside Movie Room, **14**. 2nd floor in stairs to stage, and **15**. 2nd floor West reception area.

Council Position Highlights

For the month of June we will be highlighting the position of **DEACON.** A listing of all current council members is posted on the welcome board in the west lobby.

Duties of the Deacon

The Deacons serve to maintain order and good behavior at all services of worship of the Congregation and other meetings of the Church. They are responsible for ensuring that our sanctuary is ready and equipped for worship.

1. COUNCIL / CABINET

- a. Attend monthly Council meetings, as scheduled.
- b. Attend special Council meetings, as scheduled.
- c. Attend quarterly Cabinet meetings, as scheduled. (Senior Deacon only)
- d. Attend yearly Council Retreat.

- e. Work Coffee Hour or special events when Council has volunteered to host.
- f. The Senior Deacon shall provide a written report including attendance records for each Council meeting.
- g. Attend the Semi-Annual and Annual meetings.
- h. Prepare report for Annual Meeting.

2. CHURCH SERVICES

- a. Responsible to provide a schedule of greeters, ushers and acolytes for all Church services, or appoint and supervise an Usher/Greeter/Acolyte Coordinator.
 - 1. Provide training and supervision for ushers, greeters and acolytes.
- b. Responsible for ringing of the church bell during all Church services and to train and maintain an up-to-date list of members who have volunteered to ring the bell. (Funerals are handled by the Sexton)
- c. Responsible to receive the offering at all Church Services and ensure their safekeeping by bagging and dropping into the Office safe.
- d. Reserve pews in the Sanctuary, when requested.
- e. Verify hymn boards are correct per the bulletin.
- f. Verify that flowers / rose are on the altar / pulpit.
- g. Unlock and lock Church doors prior to and after all services.
- h. Verify that the heat or air-conditioning are on prior to worship services.
- i. Maintain attendance records for all Church services.
- j. Ensure Sanctuary, Narthex and Ushers room are cleaned after each Church service.
- k. Replace pads / pencils in attendance books, as required.

3. SPECIAL

- a. Responsible for training and to maintain an up-to-date list of Auxiliary Deacons who have been approved by the St. Paul Council.
- b. One Deacon shall serve on the Worship Ministry.
- c. Responsible for ensuring that pew cards are stocked on a regular basis or appoint and supervise a Pew Card Coordinator.
- d. The Deacons shall oversee the Altar Guild to ensure that altar candles are filled properly, and altar hangings are done correctly.
